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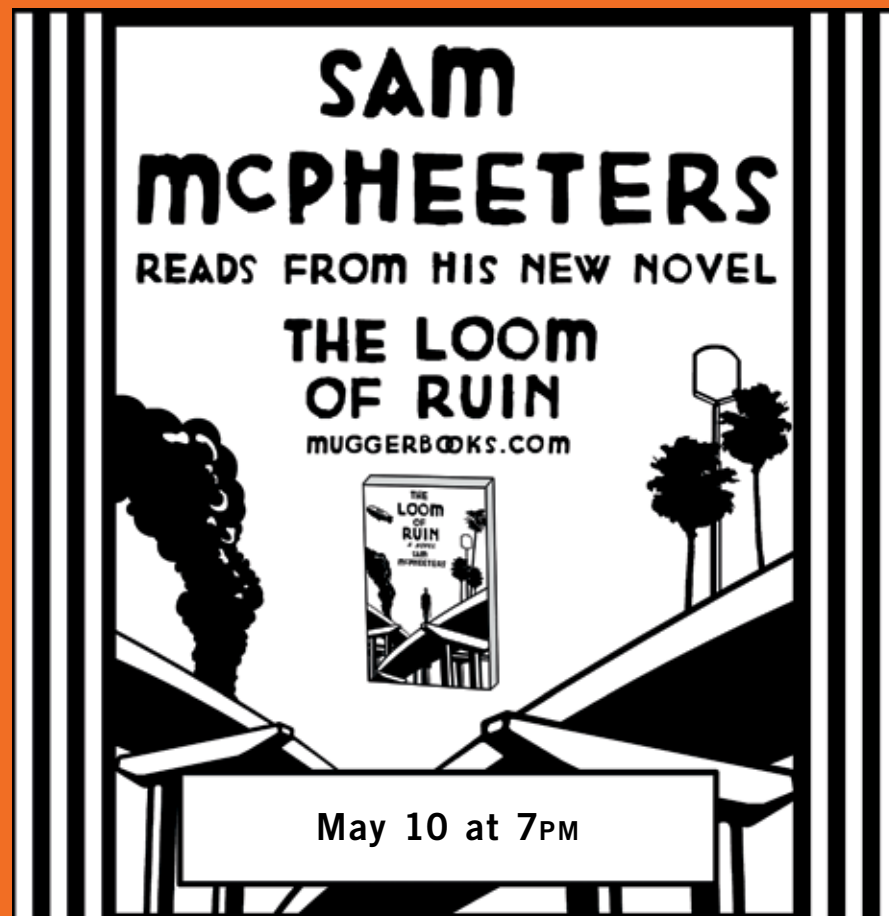
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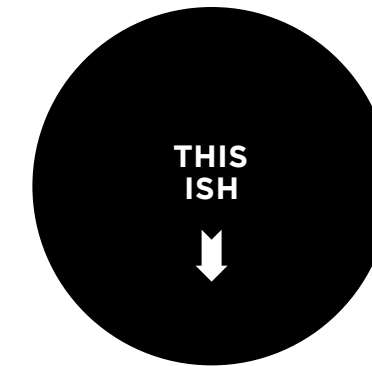

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THE SUMMER IN HOUSTON IS NOT FOR THE WEAK of heart. Oppressive heat, humidity, mosquitoes and ozone are only broken by the threat of flooding and power outages from massive thunderstorms and hurricanes. Sheridan's quote is taken at face value by Americans not attuned to living in the Texas heat- but it is worn as an ironic badge of honor for those of us who have grown used to this bayou burg. Fret not y'all, for the summer bring with it the back and call of the city's great museum's brimming with art and blasting the air conditioning. This is not a season for the zoo, the mall or the concert hall. Let the still air of a humid parking lot be blasted away by the fresh and filtered Fearing of an industrial complex where employees wear sweaters all August!

The Museum of Fine Arts (1001 Bissonnet) continues their recent trend of exclusive and astounding grabs that brought King Tut out of Egypt with Rembrandt, Van Dyck, Gainsborough: The Treasures of Kenwood House. This exhibition showcases 48 masterpieces from the Iveagh Bequest, a collection built by a Guinness heir in the waning years of the 19th century. Exemplifying the Belle Epoch, when painters like Van Gogh and Gauguin looked to Dutch masters to expand upon the artistry of the Impressionists, the Kenwood House collection demonstrates the pinnacle of art history to high culture 120 years ago. These superb paintings have never before traveled outside the United Kingdom. These rare works by Rembrandt van Rijn, Thomas Gainsborough, Anthony van Dyck, Frans Hals, Joshua Reynolds and J. M. W. Turner are making their U.S. debut at the MFAH and will travel to four other cities.

You will have to wait until July 25 to see the new exhibit at the Menil Collection (1533 Sul Ross) but many elements of Silence can be appreciated right now. Inextricably linked to the passage of time, silence can overcome one at any time in the calming space of the Menil's Renzo Piano designed building. The diffused light of the museum's ceiling gives a natural glow to the artwork of the amazing mid-century gallery featuring an extensive collection of Jasper Johns, Andy Warhol, Robert Gober, Mark Rothko and others. Rothko specifically invoked silence to shape space and consciousness. Nowhere is this more alive than at the Rothko Chapel, where the artist's darkly foreboding late work dominates the gallery. Long used as a non-denominational and cross-cultural space for worship, the chapel is also a prime space for meditation and silent contemplation.

An original score for 4'33" by John Cage will be a central to Silence. This three-part composition for the piano first performed by David Tudor contains no playing or music. Instead, it forces the listener to contemplate the ambient sound surrounding the audience- corroborating Cage's assertion that there is no such thing as silence. Other works in the exhibition include "Box With the Sound of Its Own Making" by Robert Morris, a small wooden cube containing a three-and-one-half-hour audio recording of its fabrication; "Violence Violins Silence", by Bruce Nauman, that flashes the words of its title in neon; and documentation of "One Year Performance" by Tehching Hsieh, in which the artist spent a year in a cage without speaking, reading, writing or listening to radio or TV.

Wherever the summer takes you out in the sun- to the beach, tubing the Guadeloupe, drinking at icehouses, swimming in the neighbor's pool, fighting to keep your garden alive- make a little time to stop at one of the iconic museums that bring the world to Houston. Even if you don't like the artwork at least it'll be nice and cool inside. **FPH**

After all, what festival is complete without a freaking thirty-foot water wall that turns on and off when it senses movement? The water wall is a collaborative project between members of TX/RX Labs and Exurb Collective. You might remember the Exurb guys from last year because they built the way-cool Theremin gates. You know, those things that made all the weird noises from a Fifties sci-fi movie when you walked through them. No, that wasn’t just all those brownies you ate that morning. Anyway, I’m sure it’ll be hard to miss.

And as if that wasn’t enough, other contributing artists include Bamm! Collective, Arthur Bates, Bleep Labs, Brittany Bly, Jacob Calle, Carve Skate Shop, Eric Castorena, Molly R. Clark, Bryan Cope, Joshua Davis, Patrick Doyle, Woody Golden, Stephanie Gonzalez, Gregg Higgins, Brisa Jimenez, Daniel Johnston, Aimee Jones, Junior Printmaking Congress, Kristine Noel Photography, KREET-n, Ana Maria, Matt Messinger, Andy Nadolny, Frank Olsen, Chelsea Paquette, Michael C. Rodriguez, SDC Productions, Stephanie Toppin, Frances Trotter, Jason Villegas, Sarah Welch, Brett Osborne, Jason Poland, and the one and only Tim Dorsey. Now that’s a lineup.

Oh yeah, and when you get tired of all the awesome art activities, you might want to sit down and take in one or two of the musical artists that will be accompanying your day of art decadence, at no additional cost! Now if you don’t mind, I’m going to check out this Willie Nelson guy before I go. **FPH**



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This month Michael Bergeron, film editor for Free Press Houston interviews himself:

WHAT’S YOUR FAVORITE FILM?

It’s a constantly moving line. I watch hundreds of films a year, so the actual favorite tends to change from year to year, even day to day. I also rate directors as high as certain films so I can say I like City Lights by Charlie Chaplin or Sherlock, Jr. by Buster Keaton but I’ll watch any film they’ve made, anytime. Sullivan’s Travels, Sweet Smell of Success, The Searchers, Dr. Strangelove, The Manchurian Candidate, The Great Escape, Three Days of the Condor, Network, The President’s Analyst, Fast Times at Ridgemont High, Dazed and Confused, Pulp Fiction, Almost Famous, The Big Lebowski, Russian Ark, I Heart Huckabees, any film with talking animals. Better not to get me started. Recent films like Drive or Inglourious Basterds I would tend to call instant classics, and this year has offered some honorable if not down-right quaint movie experiences like God Bless America, Damsels in Distress and Cabin in the Woods.

WHAT’S YOUR FAVORITE GENRE?

Sci-fi or horror but old school like Earth vs. Flying Saucers or Tod Browning’s Dracula.

WHAT’S YOUR LEAST FAVORITE GENRE?

No such creature exists. Directors can be a genre just based on their output, and then subdivide those films into categories. Or take the sub genre of films released

by major studios but in less than 500 theaters, then in less than 50 theaters, then both the above but with no recognizable actors; then all of the above only as a release from a boutique distributor or as a foreign film. Or, how about taking films of different stripes and colors but grouping them by decade; action films from the 60s like The Train, The Professionals, or The Guns of Navarone must appear fake to someone raised on current actioners (like Transformers or The Avengers) even though in classic films special effects were usually done on camera and certainly not with computers.

WHAT’S YOUR BIGGEST PET PEEVE IN FILM?

Verisimilitude, but when the reality of the film doesn’t fit the style. A fantasy or satire can have leaps of faith and still begat believability, like say Kick Ass. A streetwise gangster epic should have realistic exchanges of verbal treats and gunfire while a romantic comedy should have a plausible motive for two people falling in love aside from the fact the couple are always impossibly handsome. When brothers look nothing like each other, like Alexander Skarsgard and Taylor Kitsch in Battleship really takes you out of the scene. Those guys aren’t even brothers with different mothers.

WHAT MOVIE NEEDS A SEQUEL?

I once asked Matthew Broderick if there would ever be a sequel to Ferris Bueller’s Day Off and without missing a beat he looked at me and quipped “Have you written the script?” The upcoming Prometheus (June 8) is a prequel

to Alien, and the reunion of that film’s director Ridley Scott with that franchise. A franchise that, by the way, has itself split into parallel universes of the Alien and the Alien vs. Predator cosmologies. 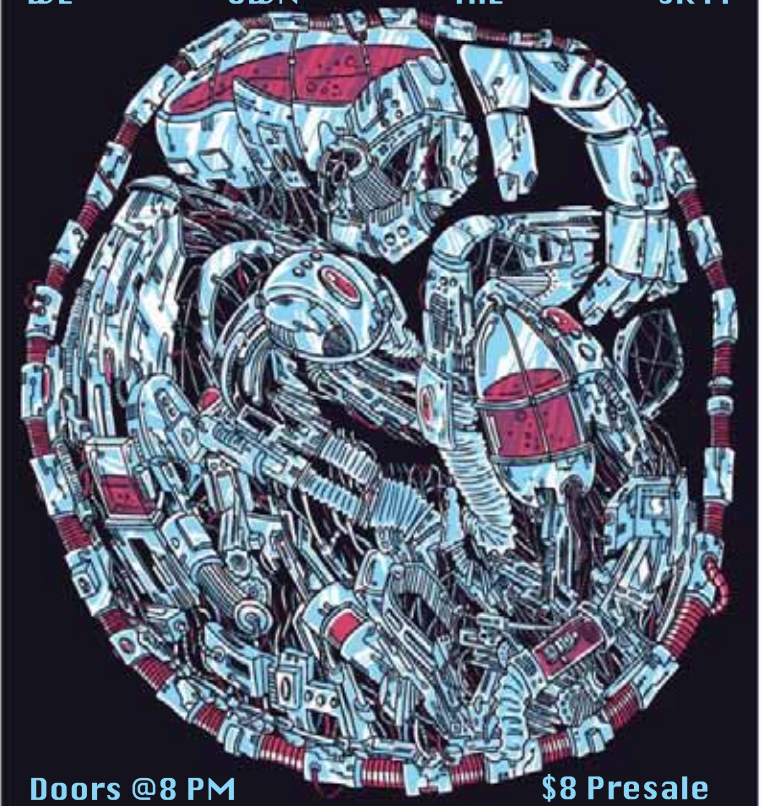
WHAT DO YOU REGARD AS THE LOWEST DEPTH OF MISERY?

Prince Myshkin’s pretty cool, but then so is Ignatius J. Reilly.
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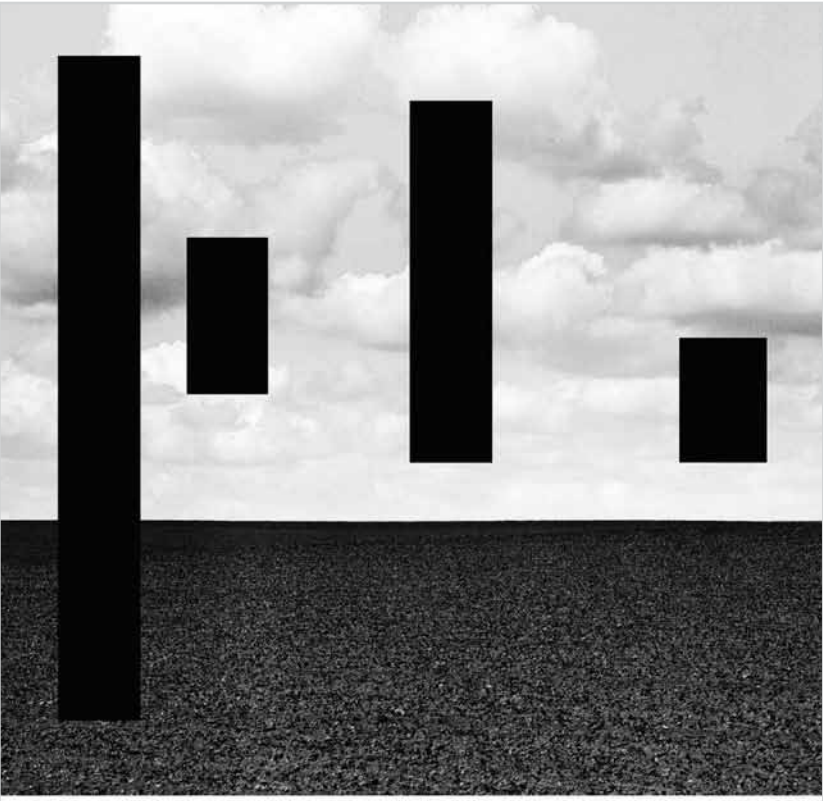

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HED: The Fatal Flying Guilloteens: A Two Sided Blade of The Absurd and Sublime
DEK: A brief analysis of the band's live performance, with footnotes.

Two live recordings exist of Houston, TX, math blues glue-sniffer's Fatal Flying Guilloteens that encapsulate the raucous five-piece fuck up's shows rather succinctly. One was captured in the early aughts at Bellingham, Washington's storied 3B Tavern.

"Apparently, if a Bellingham crowd likes the band, they throw beer on them," singer/shit-stirrer Shawn Adolph says to the assembled crowd. "Please throw a lot of beer on us."

What you hear next is the band ripping into a song that sounds like Jesus Lizard being teabagged by Lightning Hopkins (1), "Never Underestimate An American," off their debut Estrus 7-inch EP Ask Marie Antoinette. (The disc would later inspire Sofia Coppola to write and direct Marie Antoinette (2), which starred Kirsten Dunst, a bat with giant boobs (3).) But its what you can't hear that matters.

The crowd obliges. They shower the band with beer. All of it. Every ounce of ale and lager and pils served at the 3B that night never saw the bottom of a bladder. It wound up, as commanded, on the Guilloiteens. Their guitars, their amps, their drums, their stupid, gimmicky matching Lone Ranger outfits—all of it, soaked. Dripping. (3)

I know this, because I was there. I played guitar in the band. I also screamed on a few songs. I remember my amp smelled of stale beer for the rest of tour. It's a wonder any of our gear worked afterward. (Many times, it didn't.)

The show at the 3B that night was everything we wanted and expected from The Fatal Flying Guillotine Live Experience™. It was dangerous, loud, wet, sticky, hot and exuberating, both for us and the crowd. But most of all, it was fun. Our good shows always teetered on a line between absolute disaster and absolute purge. That was the idea anyway. When we were good, when things were clicking, you didn't know if you were going to get punched or kissed, hugged or body slammed. Sometimes, you'd get body slammed as you were being kissed.

We were like the last season of *Celebrity Apprentice* if every cast member was Gary Busey. It was tragic and comical and warped and made little or no sense and was bottom line, of benefit to no one with even a hint of moral or intellectual standards.

We'd all read the Led Zeppelin biography, *Hammer of the Gods*, and wanted to live it. Only we'd stopped reading past the part where Jimmy Page fucks that girl with a tiny shark. Since we were too fat (4), ugly (5), gay (6), proud (7) or Mexican (8) to fuck wit any girls, we fucked our instruments instead, and by extension, the audience's ears and sense of what was fair or just.

These aural shark-fucking orgies (9) were a thing to behold, grand in every conceivable way. They felt like doing whippits underwater, your head vibrating with the force of the Space Shuttle in liftoff, your body cocooned by the gentile caress of God's tasteless nectar.

But we were bad sometimes too. And by sometimes I mean often. Which brings me to the second live recording that sums up the FFGLE™. This one from a show in Missoula, Montana, on the night the city very nearly burned to the ground. A forest fire was raging across the state, and the homes of Missoulians (10) were being destroyed, some of whom were in the crowd that night.

We were playing a funeral, and everyone in the audience that night had lost something dear to them. The sound guy, in fact, told us he'd lost several thousand dollars worth of his prize KISS collection earlier in the week and was still in mourning. (11) He'd heard of our wild antics, and asked that we attempt to calm them, and go easy on him.

We were too drunk, young and dumb to pay him much mind. We played louder than we should have for such a tiny room. We played out of tune. We played off time. Our inner Gary Busey's were making a mockery of our band, the town we were playing, our songs, our lives.

Instead of jerking the wheel and pulling our burning caravan of shit back onto the road, we pushed the gas. Shawn, in full on HATE FUCK (12) mode chastised the crowd 'What the fuck are you doing here, Missoula? YOUR CITY IS ON FIRE, YA DUMB SHITS!!'

It was the absolute worst. I once played the recording for a guy who'd made a mint in the dot-com boom before it went bust, and he wanted to release it to the public on a label he'd start just to do so. It would be called Fatal Flying Guilloteens in ... The Worst Live Show Ever Recorded, was his idea, and it would be filed under comedy.

So, those are your two options with us. Both are an experience, I suppose. Which one will you get on June 2nd, 7:10pm from the 29-95 stage? I'm not sure. You'll have

to show up to find out. I do know two things though. 1) We haven't played on a stage together in six years, and this will likely be the last time we ever do. We want it to be good. We really do. We even plan to practice, which is something I can't say we ever did in the 10 plus years we existed. And 2) We will have a Biggie Hologram (13) to combat the Tupac Hologram that Snoop, who is playing on the main stage at the same time, will have.

In the early morning hours of April 16th 2012 we arrived at the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC) at Brookhaven National Laboratory in New York, to speak with researcher Zhangbu Xu. In a recent experiment, Xu fired gold ions at near light speeds into each other. This in itself would seem nothing new - Xu had been working for years at the Laboratory and only last year discovered antihypertriton (the heaviest known antimatter). Yet, the collision that day produced something so unexpected and heavy that Xu's excitement turned to fear. "The Explosion of the atoms produced this unearthly explosion," recalls Xu, "Somehow we survived and, as we looked into the glowing darkness, there arose this multitude of stacks that went as far and as deep as we could see - multiple stacks in separate dimensions. Then, in front of each stack, there arose a dark one - he called himself McCarthy, Robert McCarthy - and he held a mighty axe that was as unimaginable in its power. Then, as he rung out a chord, there arose a second dark figure. He called himself Richard Beeman who swung sticks with a frightful and mighty force. Finally, there arose a third figure, Tony Kaelin, whose axe I do not dare describe. As we cowered behind the lab's protective barrier, we heard the sound they created. It was an ungodly roar of doom! Some of the younger and inexperienced researchers raised their heads to see. I knew better and tried to stop them but the Rock produced was too loud and my voice was drowned out. I could only sit there in horror as their bodies fell back lifeless and headless - their heads literally blown away. Yes, our work led us to the antihypertriton last year but we knew there were heavier things out there and our lust for knowledge had only been whetted with that discovery. As we watched RHIC implode into a singularity and many of our colleagues die horrible gruesome deaths, we realized that this arrogant quest for heaviness had brought doom and ruin not just to us but possibly to this world. What we had discovered was a heaviness borne of Rock yes, but this was a rock not from this world...not of this dimension but... From Beyond. That is why we call it 'From Beyond' but I beg you, beware; From Beyond is a heavy not meant for this world."

We don't take such warning lightly but we had arrived here on assignment and when we asked Xu for an audience with From Beyond, he merely shook his head and lead us solemnly down to the secret, heavily-fortified government complex where From Beyond resides.

FPH: A lot of people consider rock and roll dead. Why do you think Rock is still relevant and still matters?

Robert: Rock and roll is a vampire; it cannot be killed. It only comes out at night, in dark and seedy places, and sucks the life out of all that would oppose it.

Richard: You cannot replace the alchemical and deeply personal experience of a band creating music live with real instruments. Pre-recordings and digital instruments, no matter how technologically advanced, will never contain the pure, raw, unharnessed aggression that makes rock music so fulfilling. The live show is more important than ever though for this reason. A lot of the shit gentrified today as "rock" has gotten away from that purity in many ways.

FPH: What makes for a truly heavy band?

Robert: For me, heaviness is just as much about the content as the music. If a band is truly heavy, you feel that weight, and it brings you to their level. I think Beethoven is heavy, and he doesn't have 8 Marshall stacks behind him, although he might have been able to hear that a bit better.

Tony: Riffs, Content, and Mystery.

Richard: A killer frontman (or woman), unapologetic guitars and big drums. A distrust of conventional wisdom and exhibiting animosity toward the status quo. A refusal to ignore the dark and evil parts of the human experience.

FPH: You guys have a very holistic approach to your band. Not only do you have a certain sound but you also have a look when it comes to your graphic design.

Richard: Sound and visuals are both communication mechanisms in terms of music, so when you can combine the two well, your message or the experience you purvey can be much more powerful and complex.

Robert: I do most of the artwork, at least conceptually, and I get help from the rest of the band as far as execution. I'm very inspired by optical perception art, like the Family Dog's work during the 60's. I love 60's and 70's B-movies, particularly Hammer Horror and biker flicks, like *Psychomania* or *The Devil's Bride*. Anything with Christopher Lee. My favorite horror movie is *Suspiria*, not only for its stylistic approach, but how great the soundtrack and story is. Lately I've been getting really into the Coffin Joe movies, like *Awakening of the Beast*.

Tony: Yes the ideas are conceived by Robert and his love for the old horror psych but both Richard and I have an extensive back ground in graphic art and design. I own www.kcsprinting.com which is a print shop in the Heights and I print a lot of our merch what not.

FPH: How did the band come together?

Robert: Richard and I have been playing in bands together for a while, like Thunderkunt. Before that, we had played together in a high school band, doing mostly our own bastardization of metal and Queens of the Stone Age covers. Right before Thunderkunt went on hiatus, I finally started getting my act together and writing a lot of songs.

Richard: We found Tony and convinced him to pick up a bass for us after we had already recorded this EP.

Tony: I'm a guitar player/vocalist but now I'm a bass-ist...pretty weird if you ask me...but I dig it. It's helping me grow as a musician.

FPH: What do you hope to accomplish with From Beyond?

Robert: One of my goals is to inspire other musicians, and to also pay tribute to the people that have inspired us. I'd like to be able to cover a lot of ground, musically, never standing in the same place for long.

Tony: Make great Music that melts faces and leaves people wanting more while having a good time of course. After all that's why I do this - to have fun and let go of the world for a while. If you're a musician you know what I mean, there is that level that you get to where you're just gone and into it, into that moment and nothing else even exists. That's what I want people to feel when they hear us.

Richard: ...creating some really heavy music that we like, and that ultimately will find an enthusiastic audience of metal and psychedelic rock lovers.

FPH: Robert, you play through a lot of amps. Why so many?

Rob: I play through vintage Orange and Sunn heads, and I have two full stacks, one on each side of the stage. We do the same for bass. People always tell me that it's unreasonable, but I can't hear them. I like to keep the band in beast mode, and we make sure they can hear us in the back.

FPH: Tell us about the new release.

Robert: We recorded these songs at Digital Warehouse a long time ago, and it's taken a long time to get the music out because we are funding this ourselves. No kickstarter, no labels, nothing.

Richard: One song, *The Heavy Wait*, was actually something we started writing and playing together back in high-school. We recorded all the instruments for seven songs in three days, and only kept four songs.

FPH - What about new material you are writing. It's a lot less doom.

Robert: Almost all of our songs are different, and I hope it stays that way. There is so much that I want to accomplish musically that I would be doing myself a disservice by stagnating in the repetition of a formula.

Richard: We have a lot of musical influences between the three of us, so I think we won't ever be content with writing and playing just long doomy or sludgy metal songs. Our newer stuff is much more refined, and more purposeful, because we have been working together on our sound for a little while now.

FPH- What are some of the reactions you want to evoke in people with this music?

Robert: I see a lot of girls covering their ears. If our music could do the whole Bill and Ted save the world kind of thing, I guess that would be pretty neat. Might do the opposite, though. You never know.

Tony: Mostly blank stares and dropped jaws, Bug eyes from the sheer power, and emotions. People trying to pull themselves back together.

Richard: Adrenaline induced panic, soothed by euphoric awe. Sonic enlightenment.

What the fuck are you looking at?

Early voting has begun for this year’s primary, and November is not so far off. Inside the loop might be a crazy liberal orgy; however, let us not forget the sea of red that dwells everywhere else in this state. And this year at the polls, your local tea party enthusiasts, The King Street Patriots, have a million-man march prepared just for you. They plan on deploying “poll watchers” to all corners of the nation with the intention of sitting, watching, and waiting on you to do the highly unlikely act of voting as your dead grandmother. So just in case you thought you were going to sneak one over on these asshats, think again.

The King Street Patriots (KSP) have been stalking us at the polls since 2008. The KSP started a poll watching campaign entitled, True the Vote, and just last month held a sold out conference here in Houston. True the Vote was kick started because according to these conspiracy theorist voter fraud is ruining America. Never mind the fact that five voting complaints involving voter impersonation were filed with the Texas Attorney General’s Office from 2008 to 2010. In 2010, the Justice Department interviewed voters about allegations of such tactics being used on them by KSP trained poll watchers. Nothing screams freedom like having the furrowed brow of a middle aged white dude hovering over you as you attempt to cast your vote.

ID or no ID’s one thing is for sure these creepers will be caravanning their way to your polling place with the intent to harass and intimidate you. True the Vote’s website and most recent conference list their short term goals as having trained a million poll watchers around the country come Election Day. And while they might have set their goal a bit high the scary part is they seem to be on track to fall just under their one million man mark. According to the True the Vote National Elections Coordinator, Bill Ouren, voters should feel about poll watchers they way they do about the popo’s, “Like driving and seeing the police following you.” Oh shit, someone remind me to leave my one hitter at home on Election Day. I propose we all make shirts that say something along the lines of, “What the fuck are you looking at?” **FMH**

June arts preview: Welcome to the Doldrums

June is one of the hardest months for Houston arts fans. Between that big music festival at the start of the month and the biggest parade/bacchanalia in the city at the end of the month there aren't too many people focused on going to the theatre or the museum. Since most of the companies in the city end their seasons in May it's pretty understandable why June is almost ignored in the art world. This year proves that June doesn't have to be spent running from air conditioned car to air conditioned apartment to air conditioned bar, hanging poolside or lounging on hipster beach—also known as Menil Park.

Between the Houston Ballet's production of Romeo and Juliet, The Alley's revival of Noises Off and The Hobby Center hosting a production of The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas Houston's biggest companies and houses are playing it safe for the midpoint of the year. There is one notable exception when it comes to interesting programming at the massive edifices surrounding Jones Plaza.

You talk about how well versed in music you are, how you're always looking for new bands and interesting sounds for your DJ sets at the strip center bar but you've never heard of him. Your hip friends don't have him on vinyl, the iTunes genius didn't recommend him based on your collection and you didn't torrent his entire back catalog the night after your last break-up. And for that you are not forgiven because it is damn near impossible to describe Nigerian born Fela Kuti without using the word legend. He and his bands, Afrika '70 and Egypt '80, almost singlehandedly pioneered the creation of Afrobeat by throwing the advanced polyrhythmic drumming of traditional West African Yoruba music, the fat horns and guitar armies of post-colonization Ghana high life, the kicking bass lines of funk and the odd time signatures of early 1960s London jazz into a blender with a heavy shot of 1969 L.A. Black Power politics and hitting puree.

And what made Kuti a legend was the unusually ballsy decision he made after he came up with his recipe. Instead of staying in the relative safety of the US or London and criticizing the Nigerian government's response to Biafra's attempted secession or the looting of his country's oil revenues by the military, Kuti took his high energy new sound and his massive band and went back to Lagos, set up in the Empire hotel ballroom and began to attack and criticize the power grabs, oppression and outright looting being out by governments throughout post-colonial Africa. And he paid for it.

After releasing his biggest album Zombie in 1977, Kuti's home and recording studio were raided. By 1,000 soldiers, who beat him almost to the point of death burned everything he owned—including his instruments and master tapes—and threw his elderly mother out of a second story window causing fatal injuries. Seven years later a different government—this time a military dictatorship—decided they'd had enough of Kuti's criticisms and threw him in jail. The charge on the docket was currency smuggling, but everyone knew it was because he wouldn't lay low and keep quiet. It took Amnesty International and about half-a-dozen more groups getting involved before Kuti was finally released from prison—almost two years after he was arrested.

After his release he continued fighting against corruption and dictatorships. In '86 he shared a bill at Giants Stadium with that sanctimonious Irish rocker, the biggest Hispanic musician to get airplay on classic rock stations and a group who only gets played at Christmas parties. In '89 he released an album attacking Ronald Reagan and Margaret Thatcher for their continued support of Apartheid. And in 1993 he was arrested again, this time the dictatorship accused him and four of his people with murder. It didn't stick, but it didn't matter. Kuti was too sick and too exhausted to fight anymore. In 1997, after nearly 40 years of performing, Kuti died of complications related to AIDS.

And then he was largely forgotten by the Western world until Will Smith was filming scenes for Ali and a random extra came up and asked why there wasn't a movie about Kuti. It took 10 years and the combined weight and money of Jay-Z, Will Smith and Jada Pinkett Smith to make something happen. After the musical opened on Broadway in 2010 it received 11 Tony nominations and 4 wins, which is a fancy way saying go see this play. Not only because it's good but also because it—like other Love, Janis, Rock of Ages, Mamma Mia! and other jukebox musicals—is designed more as concert and less as a traditional musical. Also the audience can and is encouraged to dance.

Catastrophic's head honcho Jason Nodler describes the world premiere of company member Miki Johnson's play American Falls as an Our Town for the recession ravaged. According to Catastrophic's press kit the show “follows a day in the lives of six living people and two dead ones in American Falls, Idaho.” It focuses on the mundane and epic, the trivial travesties and pop culture commentary that make life in America so damn difficult and all too rewarding. Like most Catastrophic shows, American Falls is sure to be an experience that leaves audiences profoundly changed and radically different from how the play found them.

In 1999 a Fort Worth native named Ty Nguyen-Reed graduated from the Illinois Institute of Technology with a B.S. in Chemical Engineering. She joined the U.S. Army and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant—making her one of the handful of Vietnamese women serving as officers in the military. Over the next 10 years the world would change rapidly and Nguyen-Reed's place in that world changed radically. She served four tours in Iraq and in between her duties as company commander for logistics and combat power to the brigade Nguyen-Reed worked to help promote reconciliation amongst the sects. She organized district-wide soccer tournaments for 10,000 Iraqi children and helped establish vocational training for women.

It was on her third tour with the First Brigade, 4th Infantry Division that Nguyen-Reed had another life changing discovery. While working on rebuilding projects in South Baghdad Nguyen-Reed was approached by a woman named Fatima. Fatima's story was all too common: young—not even 30—and a widow, she'd lost her husband to a suicide bomber, she was struggling

to feed her three kids and keep a 300-square-foot roof over her head. Like most of her friends Fatima wasn't looking for charity or handouts, she was trying to find a way to turn her artistic talent into something that could sustain her family. Nguyen-Reed met with Fatima and nearly 30 other Iraqi women and realized that their paintings, baskets and handicrafts could find a market in the U.S. Nguyen-Reed got in touch with her sister, Teresa Nguyen, who was finishing up a degree in Journalism at SMU and they decided to form the Janan—meaning heart in Arabic—Collection as a way to bring the work and art of Iraqi women to the U.S. **FPH**

Making the Case for Comedy: FPSF 2013

“Where humor is concerned there are no standards - no one can say what is good or bad, although you can be sure that everyone will.” - John Kenneth Galbraith, economist

For almost a year now, I've been hosting the Open Mic Knight at Fitzgerald's, where local and touring stand up comedians are given ten minutes to perform. For me, that ten minutes can seem like an eternity filled with verbal internet memes and pop culture reminders offering little to no hope of laughter. However, there are times when that ten minutes can be an ever so brief glimpse into what Houston stand up comedy once was, and what it could become again.

To some of you, that statement probably seems a little harsh. And it is. I'm not ashamed of my high expectations... which is why making a case for a comedy stage at Free Press Summer Fest 2013 is no easy task.

Most of the other major art and music festivals (Fun Fun Fun Fest, SXSW, Bonnaroo, etc.) have stages devoted to comedy, and it's never just a stage with a PA and a microphone. They are well-organized, equally funded stages, supplying a demanded type of entertainment. High profile comedians and entertainers are booked to attract sponsors; and the local talent serves as a supplement. And without the need for complicated production values such as bright lights and state of the art sound quality, this concept of a comedy stage at FPSF doesn't seem like a huge undertaking. So, why NOT have a stage for comedy at FPSF?

A massive arts & entertainment festival, in my opinion, should not simply produce a stage for a particular scene simply because the scene exists. That's like when you were a kid and at the end of the Little League baseball season every player got a trophy just because. And though that trophy is meant to be a reward for the child's commitment to the team throughout the season, it's still fairly innocuous. So, what are the reasons for having a comedy stage at FPSF?

As with music, a stage for comedy at FPSF would unquestionably give local comedians something to strive for; and I highly doubt that there's a member of the Houston scene that thinks Houston is unworthy of a comedy stage. That would be kind of ridiculous. Every comedian has the desire to perform in front of a large audience in their hometown. Now, performing outside in the Houston hell-raising heat is a different matter altogether. But even then, no local comedian would turn down the opportunity, which is my point. The comedy scene wants a stage at FPSF, and deeply so. And, it's fair to assume, they would work hard to get one if the decision was theirs.

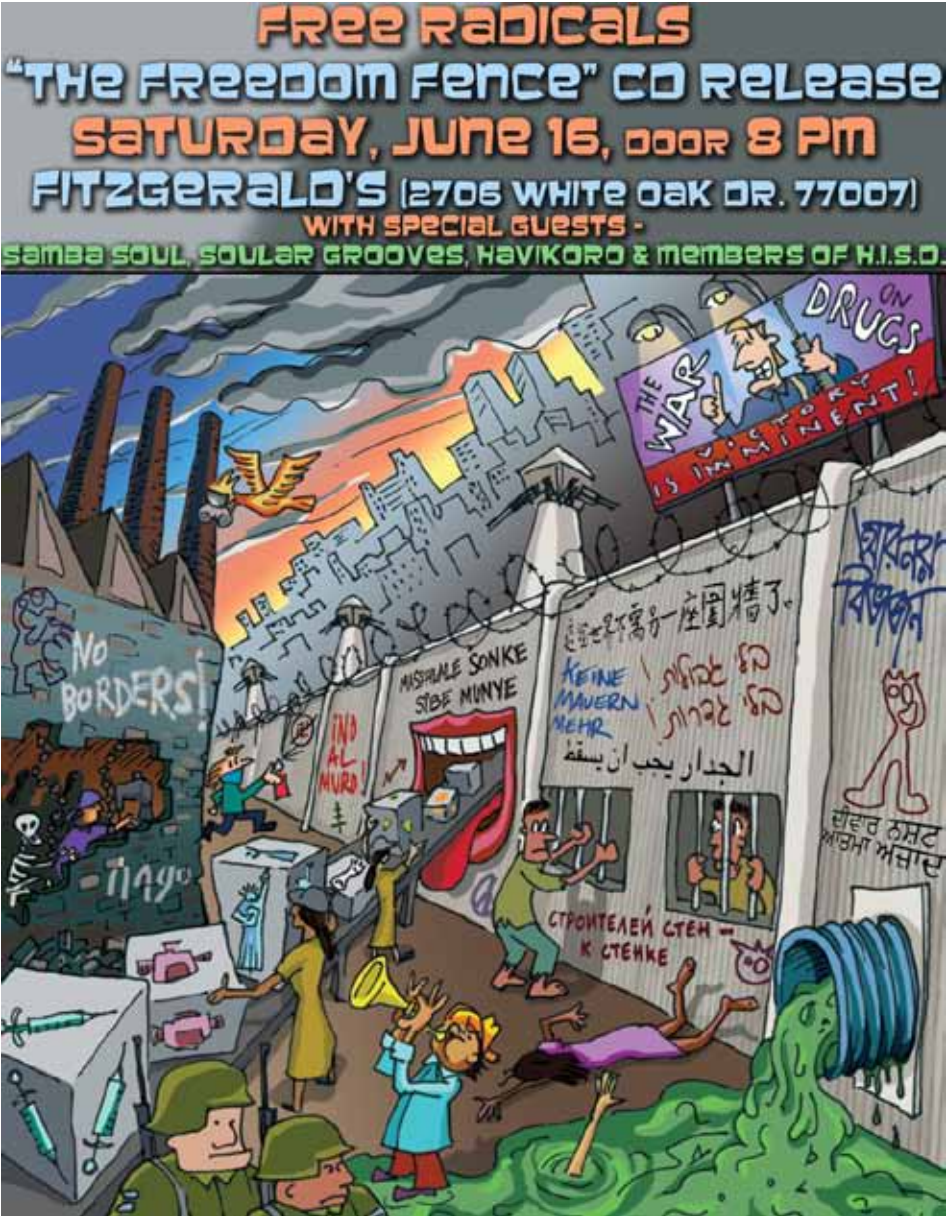
Because of Houston's long history with humor and stand up comedy, one could make an argument that the city deserves a comedy stage. While in some entitled way, that might be true, it still doesn't justify the amount of funding necessary for its success. However, the concept of pride is something worth examining.

Clearly, FPSF is not ashamed to display the local music scene. Slotting Robert Ellis and Grandfather Child and The Sideshow Tramps and the Wild Moccasins and The Wheel Workers for Main (or Main-ish) stage performances is an obvious indicator of this. So shouldn't there be just enough pride in Houston's comedy scene to necessitate a tiny little stage on the street where local comedians can perform and take their reward? Sure there should be. And maybe there is. But what I know of the FPSF organizers... they don't like to simply do new things. They like to do new things HUGE!

A stage for comedy at FPSF would cultivate and expose Houston's local talent, no matter how it's organized. And it certainly does not (and should not) be simply devoted to stand up comedy. With its sizable improv scene, Houston should get to see all of the comedies, not just the big name performers from out of town, or the mid-tiered comedians that tour the country yet call Houston their home. It's fair to say that our city's potential consumers are unaware of all that is available to them in terms of nightly entertainment. A comedy stage would help remedy that; and hopefully, the high profile performers would enjoy their time spent in Houston so much that they would add our city as new stop on their national tours in the future.

Last year, a local newscast producer named Jenny Johnson (@JennyJohnsonHi5 on Twitter) won the National Lampoon's Twitter Award for Most Offensive Female. She deserved a victory parade upon her return home to Houston, but never got one. If nothing else, the FPSF comedy stage would serve in this capacity as a token of appreciation.

Houston's comedic deity, Bill Hicks, would likely not appreciate being asked such a silly question as "Do you think FPSF should have a comedy stage?" That's my assumption, at least. I believe Bill would ultimately arrive at the conclusion that... it doesn't fucking matter. No festival of art makes or breaks a scene, a sound, an artist, an image, or a community. The FPSF festival is an annual 48 hours out of a possible 8,760. He would ask us, "What are you doing with the other 8,712 hours? That's what fucking matters." Cheers.

Reporting on Football, blogging direct from the new BBVA Compass stadium in Downtown Houston. In football the Houston Dynamo are in the inaugural opening of the new stadium playing against DC United. The Dynamo's were coming off a lost that past Wednesday night with a 1-0 lost to the New York Red Bulls at the Red Bull Arena in Harrison NJ. The only goal of the game came in the seventh minute of the match with a goal by Kevin Cooper who blocked an attempted clearance by goalkeeper Tally Hall. This ended the Dynamo franchise record seven game road trip. This match extended their losing streak as they lost the previous weekend 2-3 to the same DC United. What should be highlighted is that DC United coach Ben Olsen and 2 players Dwayne De Rosario and Josh Wolff are former Houston Dynamo players. After a lack luster first half the Houston team ended only with 9 shots on goal. But it was midfielder Brad Davis who was able to connect way on the top of the box for the Dynamo with an assist by Andre Hainault in the 67 minute. The goal was all that was needed as Houston went on to win their first game in the new stadium 1-0. With the Houston Dynamo goal Davis became the first ever to score in the new stadium. It was a great finish by Houston's all-time leading in games starts and assists to score the goal. It was 150 appearances for Houston and also his 25th goal for the team making him the third player in a Dynamo uniform to make 25 plus goals in a season. The Dynamo continues to dominate DC United with a perfect home record of 6-0-1. In other games notes from the game today the Brian Ching and Brad Davis the only remain original Dynamo players from the inaugural season made their 175 appearance in a Dynamo uniform.

Former Houston Dynamo and now head coach of DC United Ben Olsen was happy with the new stadium. He also added about the team that the first 30 35 minutes he felt they did a good job but this is there first time dealing with heat this year but all and all they did a good job. They prepare to play the following Wednesday. Houston Goalkeeper Tally Hall was happy with the 3 points but he did not get caught up too much in the ceremonial stuff. 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License to Ill

For three years we’ve heard about it. For three years we’ve clicked on the links, and for three years we’ve watched the fights. It’s been going on for so long that even the buzzwords have become stale and predictable. Hell, it’s been going on so long that even the people who get paid to tell us about it don’t seem particularly interested in talking about it. The struggle over healthcare and healthcare reform has raged on for so long and consumed so much energy that we’ve almost forgotten what we’re fighting for or against. This explains why a recent study by the Commonwealth Fund—finding that 26 percent of people ages 16 to 64 spent at least a part of last year without health insurance—didn’t get much traction.

Sure, there were a few mentions on the network news shows when the US Census Bureau released data finding that, on average, 14 to 16 percent of the US population—around 50 million people—are uninsured; but by now most everyone has lost interest in talking about healthcare and healthcare issues. Bringing up the difficulty of schlepping from one county-run clinic to another on Metro over drinks at happy hour only leads to eye-rolls and subject changes, and trying to explain to someone promoting their next show about the need for something as basic as catastrophic coverage only leads to the all too common response of “I gotta go.”

The lack of interest isn’t the problem, it’s the lack of education. Everyone knows the healthcare system sucks, but no one really knows how badly it sucks for performing artists. A 2010 survey conducted by the Future of Music Coalition (FMC) of an admittedly small sample size, 1,450 musicians, found that 33 percent didn’t have health insurance. Sadly, the likelihood of a musician having health insurance is inversely related to the amount of time he or she spends making music.

The FMC survey went on to find that amongst those respondents who spent more than 20 percent of their time making music, and received more than 20 percent of their income from music, the percentage without health insurance increases to 36 percent. The story isn’t much better for the few people surveyed who qualified as ‘professional musicians,’ defined as spending 100 percent of their time making music and receiving 100 percent of their income from music. Out of the even smaller subset of the people who can pay their rent and bills with their art—35 percent can’t afford health insur-

ance.

While none of this is particularly new—in 2011, Christian Arnheiter, of The Hates, told Jef with One F that he wished it was “easier for people to pursue their dreams without worrying about what happens if they break their leg along the way” —it is interesting, and it might make someone think twice about getting carried away and jumping off a stage during their set. Even if it doesn’t stop someone from giving their all in front of a crowd, the stats above hopefully will make them reconsider doing it alone and reaching out to some of the organizations for musicians. After all, the FMC survey shows that only 19 percent of musicians involved in some professional organization are uninsured.

MBS is a 501c3 that provides musicians with up to \$1,000 for temporary medical assistance. As of December 2008, the most recent figures available, MBS has given out \$71,400 to 190 musicians and their families.

The AFM is one of the biggest music unions in the country, and an annual fee of \$136 gets members access to a pension fund, life insurance, disability insurance, and access to a free rehearsal hall with its very own grand piano. Although one of the greater ironies about the AFM is one of the ways internet traffic gets directed to their site. Searching for “healthcare musicians Texas” leads to the website of the Texas Music Office, an official State of Texas organization run out of Governor For Life Rick Perry’s office that is designed to help Texas musicians. It’s almost impossible to overstate Rick Perry’s hatred of unions and organized labor—after all, the Transit Workers Union considers Perry to be one of the worst governors ever. So it’s more than a little humorous to see a division of his office advocating musicians to join a union.

While this isn't necessarily an organization that provides insurance for musicians, it is a specialized division of the Methodist Hospital System designed solely for the purpose of treating the injuries and ailments performing artists face. They also offer a special card that will assist performing artists in streamlining the admissions process to Methodist hospitals, and they are willing to work with the uninsured.

There are, of course, other local organizations that provide medical care for the uninsured including:

The most famous indigent care association in Houston is the Hospital District; they actually used to send out a card, but since digitizing records and using biometric scanning, HCHD has moved away from physical cards. However, they still provide medical care to thousands who live without insurance. The only problem is that, like everything else involving the government, the services are limited to certain locations and it can take a long time to get an appointment.

When Dr. Aijaz Ali Khowaja left the World Bank in 2000, he came to Southwest Houston, where he and other local physicians, business leaders, and healthcare professionals quickly realized that the community was facing a crisis every bit as dangerous as the sanitation and water problems Khowaja worked on in developing nations. In 2001, the group took the bold and decisive step of combating a lack of access to healthcare by establishing a community owned low cost clinic. Over the last decade, Ibn Sina has expanded from their first location on Wilcrest to six locations in Houston, Clear Lake and Port Arthur. **FPH**

His whole band and crew approached every little situation like it was easy. They were by far the most good-natured and professional crew we have ever worked with.
What do you miss/not miss the most about Houston?
I miss seeing my friends, and getting to play music with them every day. I also miss all the conveniences of living in a city, like coffee, food, etc. I’m very happy where I am though. We live in the woods on a few acres of land, and it’s the ideal place to come home to after a long tour.
You have achieved so many personal benchmarks in the last year. What’s next?
Keep touring through the summer, and then start working on a new record. I’m really happy just working hard and seeing progress come from it...and I hope I can continue to do that for as long as possible.
Any surprises in store for your ‘homecoming’ show at FPSF?
We’ll be playing a couple of new songs that I’m super excited about. Aside from that, you never know what chaos might ensue after a full day of outdoor drinking!

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
