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GEORGE ROMERO

Still zombie after all these years

The world is a nicer place to live with Night of the Living Dead established as a classic horror film, just as the world spins smoother with works like Mary Shelley’s Frankenstein or Bram Stoker’s Dracula as literary anecdotes to ward off the onset of ennui in its various forms.

All the imitators can come and go, and maybe some of them leave a mark, but George Romero’s Night of the Living Dead has never been surpassed as a zombie flick unless it was Romero doing the overtaking.

Night of the Living Dead was not the first zombie movie. In the 1940s there were titles like Zombies Over Broadway and I Walked With A Zombie. “Don’t forget White Zombie,” reminds Romero about the 1932 Bela Lugosi movie. “Classic films are the ones that hold up.” Speaking to Free Press Houston by phone Romero provided insight into his latest film Diary of the Dead.

“It’s a parallel story happening at the same time,” offers Romero, calling the storyline “a new beginning.” Actually Diary of the Dead plays like a spot-on re-imagining of Night only in the internet age. When the dead start to eat the living it’s captured on TV. In a matter of hours amateurs are downloading their own sightings on MySpace and YouTube. “Today all the world is a camera,” says Romero. Years ago Romero had his own website.

“Other people took it over,” says Romero meaning bloggers. “It was like some friends come over to your house and next thing you know they’ve taken over and you’re not even the guest.” Romero admits to using the web to check email and maybe a search engine scroll but otherwise he avoids it.

A group of students from the University of Pittsburgh are making a horror film when they catch wind of the zombie phenomenon. They decide to film the melee in a film-within-a-film called The Death of Death. With their teacher the sole oldster, the group embarks in an RV for a house in the wilderness hoping to avoid the carnage going on around them. Through the night various obstacles challenge the group.

Romero’s films have always excelled in horrific effects. Likewise his direction has a flair that shines in all his films. Diary of the Dead continues in that mode with a tight pacing that allows for laughs (the Amish scene) in the midst of danger. And as the story has adapted the precedents of handheld camera first person style narrative so has CGI been added to compliment the stunt work.

“We had to use CGI for the acid gag,” states Romero about a scene where hydrochloric acid dissolves a zombies face. But another action piece combines both old school effects with digitally enhanced props. The sequence involves a somebody’s brother turned zombie who gets taken out by a high velocity bow and arrow. The actor was the son of the stunt coordinator and was hooked up to a harness that slung him backward against a wall. At the same moment a CGI arrow slams through his head and impales him on said wall.

Romero has previously made four other zombie films in addition to other genres including such unlikely action dramas as

Knightriders, a 1981 film about motorcycle jousters that starred Ed Harris.

Hollywood has no use for Romero’s brand of genius yet they continue to remake his films. A Day of the Dead remake opens in April and The Crazies is listed on imdb for 2009. “The Crazies has been on the books for years, Paramount was going to do it at one point, you never know,” warns Romero. This is the guy who practically created the current horror atmosphere and yet Zach Snyder’s remake of Dawn of the Dead busts a new record while the same studio (Universal) can’t sell Romero’s Land of the Dead (fourth in the series) to save their soul. If you want Romero’s opinion Land of the Dead was perhaps a tad too Hollywood. And in 28 Days Later a film clearly influenced by American zombie epics “they’re not zombies, they’re not dead, they’re infected.”

Romero made the Hitchcock type cameo in his films up to Dawn of the Dead, but stayed completely behind the camera in the 80s and 90s. Dairy of the Dead finds him back with a one-liner as a police chief. Fans know that Romero turned up in a crucial scene in Silence of the Lambs, shot in his then hometown. “There were always films being shot in the Burgh. I had known Demme for years and he called me up when he got into town.”

ity to space shift and constantly goes for his me time on the head of the Great Sphinx. Rice found out about his abnormal powers during high school in a sequence right out of the ice pond from It’s A Wonderful Life. Highlander was also mentioned, namely because Jumper spends most of the film establishing a mythology of Jumpers, much as Highlander laid out the groundwork for what eventually followed in that franchise. Much to director Doug Liman’s credit he never has a scene where some character actually explains to another character what it means to be a Jumper. You just have to watch the film and get it. This isn’t Mr. & Mrs. Smith kind of action

on display, it’s more thought provoking sci-fi with outbursts of kinetic excitement. The best scene has Rice and another Jumper racing a Mercedes through downtown London. “If it movies I can jump it.”

Samuel L. Jackson plays Roland a white haired freaky dude who may or may not be with a secret government agency and who hunts Jumpers with the intent to kill. Diane Lane briefly comes to Rice’s aid and may serve a larger role should Jumper spawn sequels. Rachel Bilson (The O.C.) and Jamie Bell (Billy Elliot) are welcome allies to Rice. Jumper won’t replace The Matrix, but it will keep you occupied until something does.

Ah...March, how we lovers of music adore you so. No other time of the year brings with it such a glittering array of musical options. Although the number of quality shows that have passed through town since the New Year is nothing to scoff at, nothing beats the March Madness of Music in Texas.

From South by Southwest in Austin to RodeoHouston, music fans will have what they always yearn for and rarely get around these parts, and that, my dear friends, is prime selection. It's the only time of year when you get to choose between a Mesa Boogie and a Marshall and regardless of which you choose, you will always come out a winner.

From old school rap to indie rock, the most appealing thing about this month's lineup is its diversity. The very first of the month brings Snoop Dogg and his infectious brand of hip-hop musings. Though his music has transformed over the years into something a little more commercial and melodic, he has always managed to keep things interesting. Snoop Dogg will be blazing up the stage at Warehouse Live on March 1st. Don't fret, though. If starting off the month with laidback rhymes from the West Coast isn't something you're down for, maybe a refreshing twist on old classics will provide a more suitable musical experience. Adorably charming and with a voice that croons to the moon and back, Michael Buble will be performing right down the road at Toyota Center. Though Buble's music does up the cheese factor a bit, his sultry voice has a way of transforming old classics like Willie Nelson's "Always on My Mind" and Dean Martin's "Sway" into something that can be enjoyed by young and old. Check out shows at The Mink, Rudyard's and Notsuoh if you are looking for something a little more indie and experimental in nature.

If you aren't too worn out from the night before, head over to Walter's on Washington on March 2nd for an early show with The JonBenet, Bitter End and Seeker. Make sure you aren't hung-over though, because these bands are lusciously loud and not for the faint of heart. They might be the perfect precursor to a night filled with the pseudo-scariness of Marilyn Manson, who will be performing at the Verizon Wireless Theater later that night or the actual creepiness of bands like Rotting Christ who will be performing over at The Meridian.

For something a little more subdued and rich with influence, check out Built to Spill and The Meat Puppets on March 3rd at Warehouse Live. Built to Spill is an indie rock brood from Idaho with a sound that is all rock with moments of blues, folk, and pop thrown into the mix. The Meat Puppets have been around a long time, first signing with Greg Ginn's label SST Records as a punk band back in the early eighties. Their sound has evolved by leaps and bounds since those early recordings and their style is a blend of rock and roll that still breathes with the energy of their earlier punk influences. If you can't afford to make it out for this show, The Black Swans will be infusing their folky rock melodies into the walls of The Backroom at the Mink that same night. The Black Swans' songs involve elaborate stories with intriguing characters that are brought to life by soothing folk-inspired sounds and lead vocals that drip like molasses and drone on in epic Eeyore-like tones.

Look! It's only a few days into the month and already there is more music than we can handle. RodeoHouston starts this month, so if you are into popular country or want to see Fergie from the Black-Eyed Peas make sure to get your tickets soon. In addition to RodeoHouston, the SXSW festival will be taking place in Austin in mid-March. Though most of us won't be lucky enough to attend this musical orgy, many of the bands performing at the festival are more willing to stop off in Houston and throw us a bone around this time. Feel free to enjoy one, two or all of the following shows making their way around the city: They Might Be Giants with Oppenheimer at the Meridian on March 6th (TMBG's speak

They are an indie-pop band from Belfast, Ireland with a really groovy, infectious sound.), Wilco will be performing with John Doe at Verizon Wireless on March 7th. Bone Thugs-n-Harmony will be at Warehouse Live on March 9, My Morning Jacket will be performing with Yo La Tengo at Verizon Wireless on March 10th (This is probably one of the best deals you could ever get for your money. MMJ's sound is so beautifully woven and translates impeccably in a live setting. 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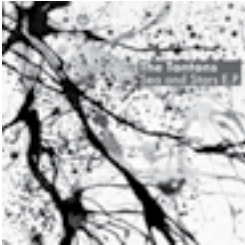
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THE TONTONS SEA AND STARS E.P.

This shit is awesome. However, I have to be honest. The EP sat on my desk for a few weeks with the myriad others that usually end-up in the graveyard of emo and singer songwriter crapola that we receive so much of.



I was frankly surprised by the five impassioned and haunting songs that *The Tontons* served up on their debut EP *Sea and Stars*. I hate to say nice things about local bands. Dammit. The band combines a tasteful mix of Asli Omar's hyper-soulful vocals, and the bands Hendrix ala' Garage aesthetic. Imagine a diffuse amalgamation of the Sugarcubes, Hendrix, Nina Simone, and a touch of punk rock sensibility. Pardon the shitty, half-priced pun, but the sticky-sweet song *Syrup* is an irresistible track laden with violins and call and response backing vocals. Atlas is also a bright spot where the band gets a touch ballsier without losing its edge and subtle nuances of Asli's voice. Their guitar players Hendrix-infused-style is rife with all the things you enjoyed about Jimi but absolutely hate about his copycats. The tones and soundscapes on this record are solid and minimal. Though it could really use some creative production and arrangement, Steve Christensen at Sugar Hill did a great job of recording this EP without creating a contrived sound that is so often heard in recording today. You know what I mean: Either way too polished or overly eager to sound low rent. The Tontons are certainly a band to watch and relish in their growth. I was lucky enough to

sit in a café in Budapest with lead singer Asli Omar. She was kind enough to answer my silly, cliché questions: **Where does the name 'The Tontons' come from?** The name *the Tontons* actually came from the second star wars movie(I think) it was the animal that Luke hid in when he got lost in the wilderness. The band actually came up with the name right after I left for school so I had no say in it. However, I think its very fitting. We were a band for a year before we had a name so it was such a relief to finally have a permanent title. **Who did you pretend to be while singing as a child?** I listen to a lot of jazz so I would have to say that my biggest influences are female jazz vocalists like Billie Holiday and Nina Simone, other then that I really like Lauren Hill and Karen O. I have respect for any female in the music industry because I feel like much of the time we are over looked or not taken seriously enough, I can't tell you how many times people have asked me if I was the girl friend of one of the band members. I never really pretended to be other singers though. My friend Zelene used to write songs for me and I would

sing hers and my own a lot. I tried out or my first band when I was 14 and sang an original song. **Tell me what you loved/hated about the recording process for the EP?** I can't say that there was any thing that I hated about recording the e.p. We did everything in one take because of our lack of funding so everything went by quickly. The entire experience was amazing. We are all really close in the band and hang out a lot so it was pretty much just us cracking jokes and playing music. The most rewarding part of the whole experience was when we finished and we got the demo. It was really fulfilling to finally hear all of our hard work. We just sat in the car in front of the studios and listened to the songs on repeat. We were all really proud. **Who is the song 'Syrup' about? Nothing to do with Pimp C, huh?** Every song I write is like a biography. They

all tell a story about someone who influenced my life in some way or another. I like to think that if the song is about you and you hear it you'll be able to tell because I usually make references to things that were said or done. Syrup is about a really wonderful guy who I didn't deserve and I hurt. It's meant to be an apology to him but it would have been really cool if I had written a song influenced by Pimp C. Maybe my next song will be. **What do we expect next from The Tontons?** We are currently in the process of recording an album, and we are going to be playing South by Southwest in March. We are also going on tour this summer. 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ELAINE GREER

There is a very exciting point in a musician’s career when, after a long time of working on their craft, they realize what they do has a value outside of their own bedroom. If you were at the Proletariat and saw Elaine Greer perform to a packed crowd last month opening for the Fiery Furnaces, you couldn’t help but feel the giddiness of a musician at that stage. Standing on stage behind her Telecaster, you could almost hear her take a deep breath before diving in.

Greer’s songs drip with sweet and simple melodies that hum inside your head long after you first hear them. In her home recordings, the songs are intimate and have an understated beauty but that night, with a full band (The Holly Hall), the songs ripped with confidence and endless possibilities. Zahira Gutierrez’s lovely harmonies and Guitarist Nick Cody’s clean and melodic guitar lines played elegantly against Greer’s vocals while JD Tucker and Grant Hickey’s drum and bass added some limber rhythmic muscle to the songs - the crowd ate up every note. The wonderful thing is, be it solo or as a member of The Holly Hall, Greer is still at a point where she has only just touched the

needle down onto the record’s groove. Greer began playing piano at 5. “I was jealous of my sister taking lessons so, when the piano teacher came over to give her a lesson, I ran upstairs, locked myself in the room with the piano, and started banging on it to show them how great I was - it worked!” Eventually, like many kids, she grew to dislike the lessons and quit. “Well,” says Greer sheepishly, “until recital! When recital came up I’d beg my mom to be back in the class just to do the recital. That would drive her crazy.” She also had a fixation with Broadway no doubt inspired by her father’s love of Andrew Lloyd Weber’s *Phantom of the Opera*. “He’d play it all the time and my sister and I would fight over who would be the girl but she’d always get stuck with being the

guy.” Then, thinking about it, she laughs with a tinge of guilt, “I’m sure she still has bitter memories of that.” By age fourteen, she started writing songs but was too scared to show them to people. When she did work up the courage at around sixteen or seventeen she would do so only in the relative safety of her room and only while facing the wall. Greer eventually did put aside her fears and joined The Bluebirds: “The songs were pretty raw and I wasn’t a very good singer yet, but Super Happy Fun Land let us play.” About a year after that first band’s dissolution, Greer teamed up with guitarist Nick Cody as an acoustic duo which lasted until last fall’s Westheimer Block Party. “We decided to add drums and bass just for the occasion. You know,” she says with glee, “It’ll be loud!” A few twists and turns later and that band coalesced into the band heard at the Fiery Furnaces show. “We all had fun playing together, but from the beginning there was some turmoil within the band,” says Greer, “Nick and the others wanted to do their own things but at that point were still playing only my songs.” The solution was that Elaine Greer, the solo artist, and The Holly Hall, the band, had to become different entities. The Holly Hall would be more of a collaborative effort while Greer would be able to exert full control as a solo artist. In fact, Greer plans to release

a solo EP later this year which will feature members of the Papermoons as well as other musicians. “It’s really exciting and I don’t want to sound like a control freak but I know how I want things to sound.” When I ask her if this means she’s found her ideal voice as an artist she replies, “I don’t feel like I’ve found the perfect ‘Elaine Greer’ voice but I think musicians and artists are always looking for their voice or what they are trying to convey...I think it’s something that probably changes throughout life as a person has more experiences and different things become more or less important.” So how does it feel to have moved from her bedroom to the stage? “It’s a good feeling to get that audience feedback – knowing people are enjoying it. It’s my favorite thing in the world so I like the idea that it makes someone happy. There is a satisfaction in playing alone in a room to myself - it’s extremely enjoyable and that’s how I write everything - but,” she adds with a gracious modesty, “I never expected people to like it.”

Look for the Elaine Greer EP as well a release by the Holly Hall later this year. Elaine Greer will be performing March 12th at the Westheimer Block Party. The Holly Hall will be performing March 31st at The Mink with Teenage Kicks, Erin Tobey, and The Pink Razorblades.

BURNOUT PARADISE REVIEWED

The art of the car wreck

It's too bad most gamers don't use their console's USB camera, because my favorite extra in Burnout Paradise, Mugshots, doesn't get the mileage it deserves: your camera will take snapshots of your victorious moments while racing against your friends, or feral strangers, online.

But the main draw here isn't flicking-off someone online, but the seamless integration of the single and multiplayer modes. With a tap of the d-pad you'll instantly hook up to race against, or just mess around with your online friends. Not just a great way to race either, there's plenty of stat keeping on each street that updates who's ahead of who for everything in Paradise City. In order to get all those people online, however, it takes a arcade approach to racing that may have some sim-gearheads wanting a bit more.

While the most talked about feature in Paradise may be the online stuff, offline

there's still plenty of racer to go around. Each intersection acts as a starting point to one of several game modes. Of which, Marked Man, and Road Rage are definitely my favorite, and are noticeably absent from the online racing. Marked man is a one man race where your opponents aren't gunning for first place, but are trying to total your ride before you cross the finish line. In Road Rage there's no finish line, and your goal is totakedown a certain number of cars before times run out. These modes had me the most hype, jumping out of my seat with holy-shit phrases cheering the amount of destruction each crash rendered. And glorious these crashes are. Each crash looks straight out of a Hollywood action flick.

Racing across the open-city can be overwhelming at first. I lost several races where I was in the first-place position, but veering off the main path sent me into no-man's-land. Even in the losses though, Paradise's open world is forgiving enough that you'll almost never feel too slighted for losing a race. Mainly, I wish there was a quick retry option on the Burning Route races where you earn advanced models of each vehicle. Burning Route races are held at very specific locations, and trudging back all the way to the start when you lost near the finish is a chore. Another side-step is the gimmicky Showtime mode that replaces the popular Crash Mode of previous Burnouts. Before you

actually felt like you caused this massive domino-like-collision, whereas now you hop along the road like a fish-out-of-water aiming for oncoming traffic. With luck, we'll get to download the classic Crash Mode in the near future. Burnout Paradise does an excellent job at ushering the arcade racer into the realm of next-gen gameplay. The forward-thinking online integration alone could have a ripple effect on other genres' multiplayer plans. Even if you're not into racing games much, give Burnout Paradise a try, if just for the crashes. My biggest challenge with Burnout Paradise, though, is prying my friends from their Call of Duty 4 multiplayer addiction to join me online.

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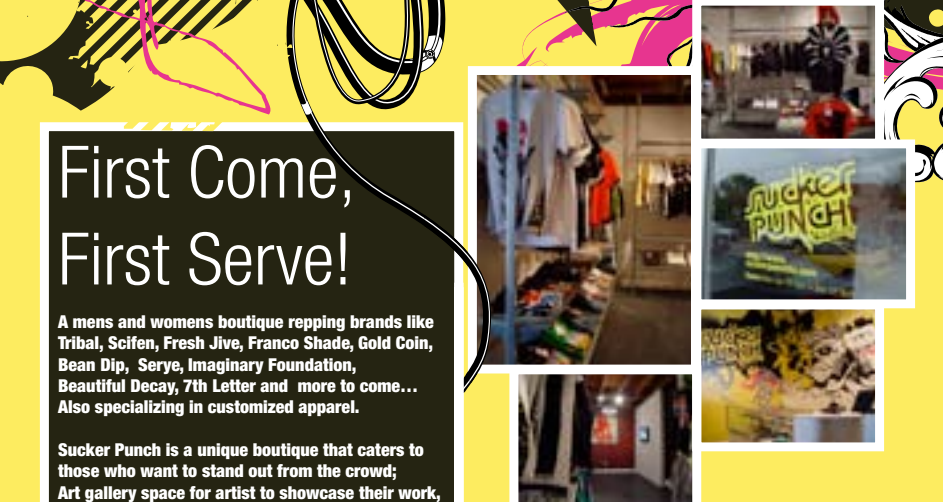
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TOP TEN SPEEDTRAPS

Chartres at Capitol

This trap makes lots of money and is in downtown when your going NE on Chartres Street. They have three spots where they hide. If your traveling downtown during morning rush hour, the police like to hide behind this restaurant on the right side of Chartres Street on Walker Street. In the afternoons I have seen the police on the left side of Chartes under the freeway bridge on both Rusk and Capitol Street. Right before West Little York on Bingle, there is a church and a Sonic Drive In and on the Corner a CVS. The speed changes quickly from 45 to 30. They sit sometimes 3 and 4 at a time in the hidden driveway and just flag you in. They do this every morning and every evening.

I-10

As you ride over bridge approaching I-10, police sit on either side of the street waiting on the bottom of the hill and catch those go over the speed limit. they also sit on the Shepherd as drivers exit I-10 and sit in the parking lot on the left.

Allen parkway at Bagby

After exiting the Dallas/ Bagby exit, you will go over the hill and get popped for doing 42 when the speed limit is 40mph

Washington at Studemont

Washington Avenue, a 4 lane road with center turn lane, is 35 mph. Enforcement varies. Occasionally, they'll setup in groups of 3 with a shooter and two people who wave over cars and write tickets. I see this mostly near downtown - not far in between Sawyer and Houston Avenue. They also frequently patrol with cars. I see people pulled over almost every day of the week.

Houston Ave at White Oak

Watch out for radar trap along Houston Avenue between White Oak and downtown. It is under near constant radar surveillance with a lower than necessary limit of about 30 or 35.

Weslayan at 59

There will be a few HPD parked there and a couple of them shooting radar directing people to pullover if they were caught. Mostly between 10am and 2pm is when they are out there.

West Bellfort at Hillcroft

There is a precinct constable hiding in the median turn arounds between Chimney Rock and Hillcroft on W.Bellfort. They seem to be there quite frequently and are hidden from view by the high shrubbery on the median.

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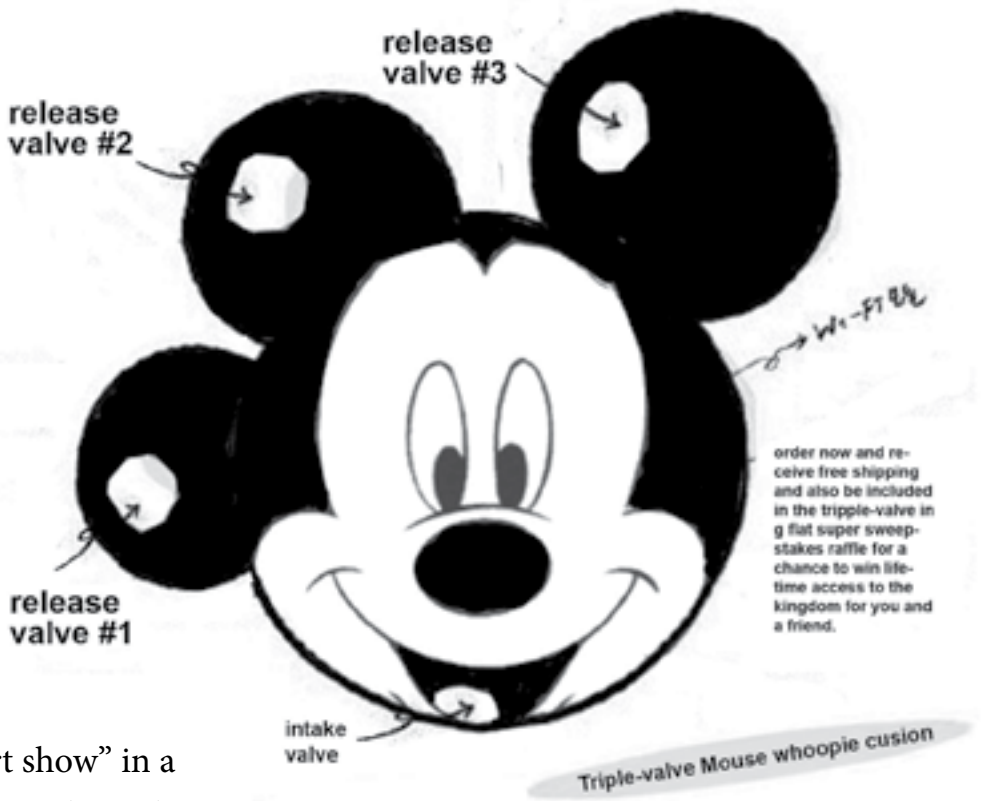
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This Land is *Not* Your Land

This fall I was installing an “art show” in a local coffee bar, and a customer got upset with me because the stuff I was going to hang required taking down the stuff that was up. He didn’t think my stuff (culture jamming posters) was art, and the other stuff (abstract Pollack-like paintings on canvas) was art.

I rebuffed him by saying something along the lines of, “You’re going to tell me what’s art?” and then laughed out loud. After the show was up for a few weeks one of the culture jamming posters was purchased by a dancer for a nominal fee. It had the words “I am not an object” written below the well-known Playboy logo. I am not sure if this is art. It’s probably not; it’s probably social activism. Whatever it is, it meant something to someone. There are many ways to be an artist and to be an activist.

Believe it or not, culture jamming plays a part in creating culture, albeit a very small but important one. In general, the Playboy example makes a social statement presumably for the public good, in a public place, and for profit (a couple of beers). The question is should Hugh Hefner have the right to demand a fee, or file a cease and desist order for unauthorized use of the Playboy bunny? Artists should have their rights protected, and corporations too, but how much control is too much? One of the ways giant media corporations are fencing in creativity and freedom of expression is through Copyright law.

Copyright, as written in the US Constitution, is to “promote the progress

of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times.... exclusive right to their own writings and discoveries.” Original copyright protection lasted fourteen years, renewable once. The idea was to promote economic and social progress in a way that wouldn’t alienate individual citizens – or blind them into submission.

Over the last forty years Congress has extended Copyright laws eleven times. I am not against Copyright law, but how much is too much? In 1998, Congress passed the Sonny Bono Copyright term extension act. That’s right, Congressman Sonny Bono. This law extends the length of copyright protection to the “life of artist plus 70 years.” That’s about five generations! Basically, every time the Copyright for Mickey Mouse is set to expire, Disney Corporation sends in their lawyers and “fixes” the law. Maybe it has something to do with national security; but however it’s done, the fixed image of Mickey is here to stay. At the same time, the Disney Juggernaut practically guarantees other works never see the light of day.

For your information, Mickey Mouse was born in 1928. If you have ever had an offhand thought about making a for-profit, triple-ear Mickey Mouse whoopee cushion as an act of civil disobedience against the latest copyright extension, forget about it, or get a lawyer because you could lose your %#\$\$. At this rate the little mouse is “fixed” and will never be part of the public domain.

While Disney’s Mickey Mouse Copyright protection is forever extending, media ownership regulations (who owns what and for what purpose) are being dismantled. This means more and more Mickey Mouse everywhere you turn. Over the last twenty five years the number of media companies dominating US mainstream media has been concentrated into the hands of a handful of the world’s most powerful corporate interests. Disney Corporation is one of them.

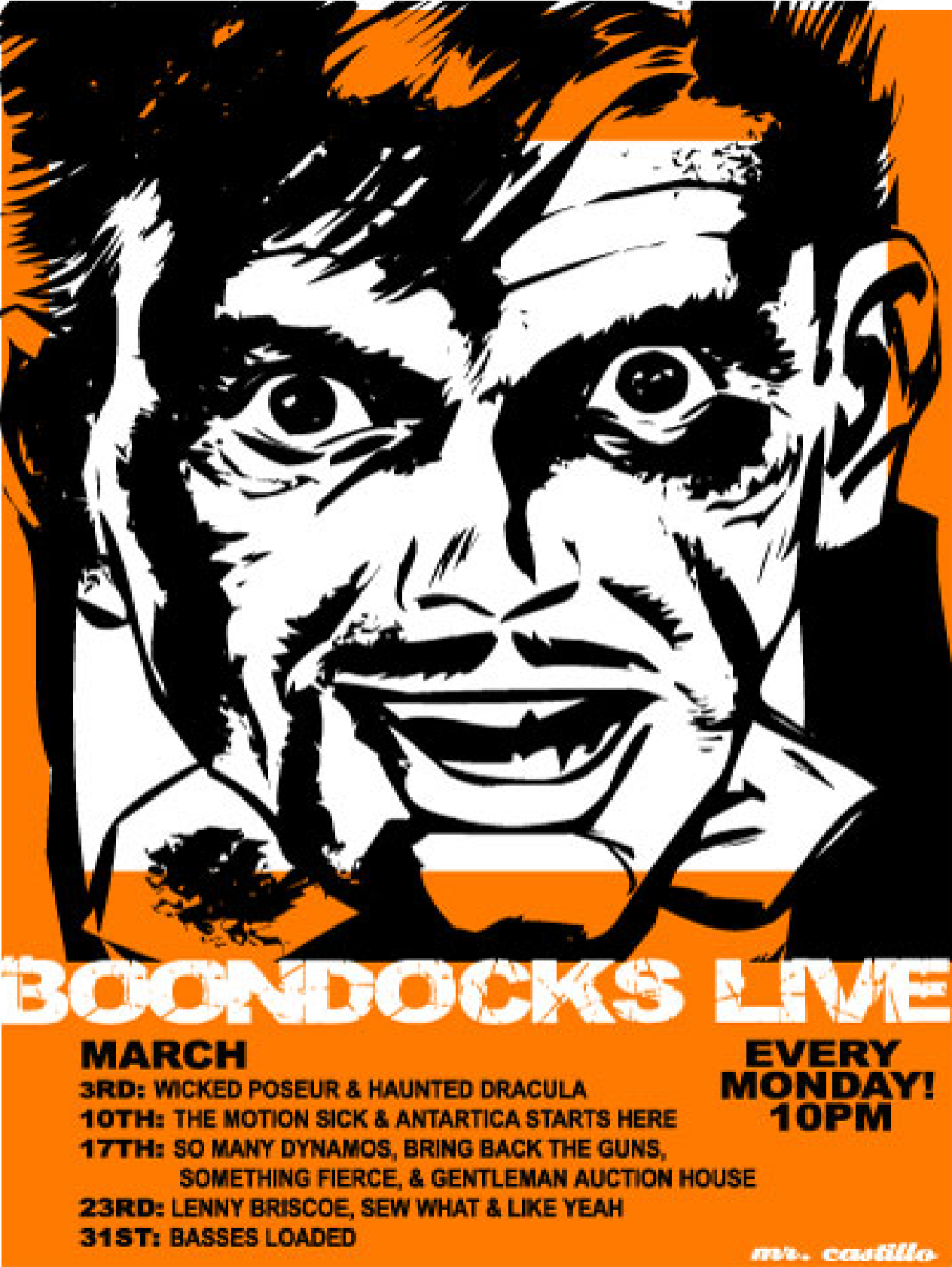
- 1983 = 50 mainstream media corporations
- 2005 = 5 mainstream media corporations

Today, five interrelated corporations control, manufacture, and operate the keys of the culture industry. They are the gatekeepers. The cultural commons is increasingly controlled, sanitized and stupefied by the urges of five mass media corporations who are more concerned about the bottom line than the public good. The main concern is to push consumption by selling audiences to advertisers. How much privatization is too much for the public good? Maybe a better question would be, is there a public good? The irony is today it’s done under the banner of the first amendment and Freedom of Expression.

As John Berger says, the art of the past has lost its authority and has been replaced by a language of images. Today, visual images surround us like language, and they can be reproduced and repurposed in infinite ways. Visual images don’t have intrinsic meaning, but the mental image or message they deliver can be symbolic. Visual images of mega brands (like Coca-Cola) have become sacred symbols, out of proportion to their significance. The image of the Coca-Cola logo is always positioned in a positive and upbeat manner, as in the 70’s jingle, “I’d like to teach the world to sing in perfect harmony.” This is great stuff from a marketing point of view, but has very little to do with cutthroat corporate objectives. Furthermore, try to find the Coca-Cola logo next to any of the following:

- Hard News
- Health issues (Obesity)
- Drugs (Prescription or Illegal)
- Sex related issues
- Poverty

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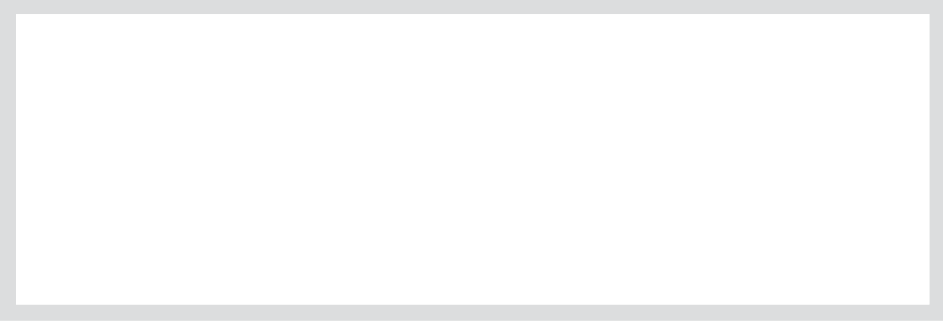


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These realities don't add value to brand positioning. Visual images have become part of the mainstream, but the cultural commons is increasingly an empire of visuals that is off limits. To paraphrase Humpty Dumpty, "When I use the Coca-Cola visual image, it means exactly what I mean it to say, neither more or less!" Do as I say, not as I do. Look and enjoy, but don't get any funny ideas. Slogans. It's so easy a caveman could do it. I'm lovin' it. Priceless. I'm overdrawn, I'm overweight, I am a Homo erectus.

While the public airwaves have been privatized, culture jamming makes fun of excessive copyright and the ultra proper-tization of culture. It's natural to borrow and rework culture. Co-option is not bad. It is a natural part of being alive. Has there ever been a work of art that wasn't in some part derived from another? Disney itself was built on works from the public domain. Going back, many of their stories and fairytales are recreations of older works. (But, you can't co-opt theirs!)

The founding purpose of Copyright is to promote cultural freedom and creative expression, not, suppress it. It makes no sense to allow a handful of people to suppress culture and sing of freedom. How much deregulation and copyright extension is too much?

Along those lines, as a (serious) prank, Kimbrow McLeod, a college professor, applied for and now owns a US trademark for the slogan "Freedom of Expression," and he wrote a book about it. Our highest ideal is a trademarked slo-

gan – a victory for freedom of expression. Authenticity, individuality, difference, and rebellion; it's all there, neatly packaged and protected. In the book *Freedom of Expression* (available through the Media Education Foundation, and select-ed stores near you), it is pointed out that Donald Trump not only has a trademark for "You're fired," but also a trademark for the human gesture he uses to say, "You're fired." So, if some kids put together some theater, sell tickets, and use *that* expression with *that* human gesture, they can be sued or made to pay a licensing fee.

This next sentence is a direct quote from the book (along with a reproduction of the Trademark certificate.) "As culture increasingly becomes fenced off and privatized, it becomes all the more important for us to be able to comment on the images, ideas, and words that saturate us on a daily basis—without worrying about an expensive, though meritless, lawsuit."

This Land is *Not* Your Land. The inter-ests of the cultural commons and the public good are increasingly at odds with obsessive and unwarranted privatization. Excessive copyright culture is at odds with the technology of the future. The idea of "fair use" which protects the unlicensed reproduction of media for the purposes of criticism, commentary, and education, should be changed to "free use." This is obvious: too much single-minded media control stifles perspective and cultural progress – it leads to narrow minded-ness like the kind you might find hanging around your local coffee bar.

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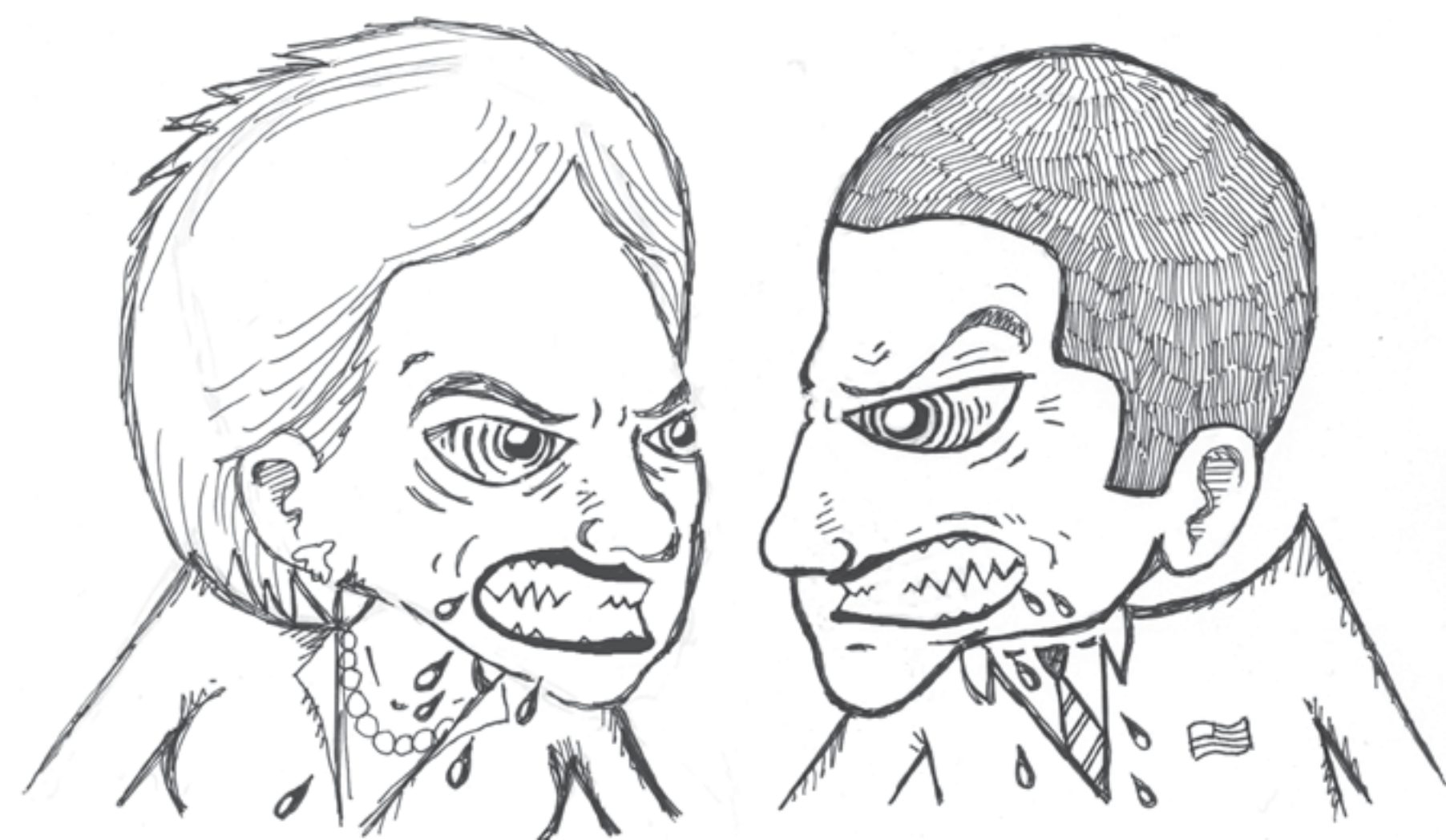
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4 REASONS 4 OBAMA

two Accountability

Obama has consistently pushed for greater transparency in government. His proposals include a “Google for Government” that would make the entire federal budget searchable from a web browser. He has aggressively pursued lobbying reforms, and been one of the current administration’s harshest critics on the issue of government secrecy. By contrast, a principal reason why Hillary Clinton failed as her husband’s ‘health care czar’ is that she insisted on formulating her plan behind closed doors--up to the point of excluding members of congress within her own party from deliberations.

The Clintons refuse to release their tax returns or make public the documentary evidence of Hillary’s supposed ‘experience’ gained during her husband’s presidency. One of the most troubling aspects of George Bush’s presidency has been the degree to which he has made secret what goes on in the White House. There is no evidence to suggest that a second Clinton presidency would reverse this trend.

three Electability

With the exception of Arkansas and New York, every contest that Hillary Clinton has won in the current primary season has been by a thin margin based on the Democratic Party’s core constituency. Every one of the primaries and caucuses that Barack Obama has won has been a landslide victory. Hillary Clinton enters the general election race with the highest name recognition and highest negatives of any politician in America. Short of improbable landslide victories in every remaining Democratic contest for the nomination, it is impossible for Hillary Clinton to win her party’s nomination on the strength of electoral contests alone.

If she wins at all, it is at the end of a process that drags out over a period of months that cuts into her party’s ability to organize effectively for the general election, that alienates independent voters, and termi-

nates with a back-room deal so repulsive to the new voters Obama has drawn that they will either stay home in disgust or start campaigning for Ralph Nader.

In a general election contest against John McCain, Barack Obama brings independents and disenchanted republicans to the table, and brings a clear and unequivocal contrast in policy and philosophy to the warmongering xenophobia so dear to the GOP’s heart. Hillary Clinton only brings her argument of “experience” against a 71 year old senator and former soldier--and the record of having voted to authorize the same war she now claims she will work to end.

four Change

It isn’t just a campaign slogan. The day that a brown-skinned man with an African surname and an Arabic middle name takes an oath to “...execute the Office of President of the United States, and ... preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States...” the perception of America changes utterly--both in the World’s eyes and to America itself. While electing a woman president would also be a landmark event, the implications are not as great--particularly not on the world stage, particularly not with regard to this woman.

America and the world need a fundamental break from the practices and policies that resulted in and are exemplified by George W. Bush. 2/12Peruvian Indigenous in Houston to Defend the Amazon

On Friday, at the Petroleum Club of Houston, PerúPetro showcased new lots available for exploration in Peru. A Shapibo indigenous leader and a couple of people involved in these issues interrupted the event to bring attention to the concerns of indigenous people in the region affected by oil expropriation. Here is their press release: Dear Friends, The Achuar, Quichua and Urarinas peoples in the Corrientes river basin in the Peruvian Amazon urgently need your solidarity and support. For over a week now, the Achuar have been peacefully blockading oil production facilities on their ancestral territory, which are operated by the Argentine company Pluspetrol and built by Los Angeles-based Occidental Petroleum. The situation has become tense and just today, an additional 150 counterinsurgency police have been reportedly dispatched to the region. more: <http://houston.indymedia.org/news/2008/02/63007.php>

2/11 The Government Jails Babies

On Saturday February 9th, MECA and Grassroots Leadership hosted a screening of Hutto: Americas Family Prison. Along with the film, community supporters heard personal testimony and learned about the ongoing campaign to shut down the T. Don Hutto immigrant detention facility. Denia, a Honduran immigrant detained at the facility shared the terrible conditions she experienced at Hutto. Her main source of stress was the fact that the food served at Hutto wasn't providing her children a nutritious meal. Her children were not allowed to have toys in their cell, received only one hour of school but no meaningful education, and were forced to sit quietly the remainder of the day. At the time, Denia was also pregnant and received no prenatal care or extra food from the facility. She worried about her unborn baby's health and feared that he was getting sick. To make matters worse, Denia's mom Maria had heard that another woman detained had had a miscarriage inside the facility due to lack of care. Maria visited Denia and her children frequently at Hutto and tried to leave them with enough money to buy phone cards so they could keep in touch with her. Denia never got the money her mom left her, just some chips and one phone card.

2/5 Privatized Prisons for Immigrants: The Expansion Continues

from the open publishing newswire: Last year I wrote several posts about the current prison-industrial complex and the increasing number of privatized prisons being used to house thousands of detained immigrants. The rise of the prison-industrial complex is one the most disturbing things going on in this country. According to a recent report by the Bureau of Justice Statistics - released on June 30, 2006 and revised in July 2007 - there are over 2 million people behind bars in the United States. At the time of the report, there were about 180,000 in federal custody, 1.2 million in state custody, and 760,000 in local jails. The BJS statistics also reported there were over 90,000 immigrants (both documented and undocumented) who were held over 12 months by three jurisdictions: the Federal system housed 33,701; California housed 15,849; and Texas housed 9,227. In a recent "year in review" report, the Department of Homeland Security announced that the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) had rounded up more than 30,000 immigrants - doubling the number from last year. According to Detention Watch Network, a D.C. based advocacy group, more than 186,600 immigrants were deported in 2006. However, more disturbingly, in 2007, ICE had detained more than 300,000 immigrants. These frightening statistics only confirm this country's commitment to lock up an insurmountable amount of people; and the reality of it all, this is an integral part of the globalization of capital.

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Protesters Greet Calderon

Cambridge, Mass—A group of protesters unveiled their banners and signs in freezing temperatures last night to greet President of Mexico Felipe Calderon who spoke at Harvard's JFK Forum. "Boston doesn't appreciate visits from those who violently suppress Indigenous movements and work to create desperate economic conditions that force millions of their citizens to migrate in search of better lives," read a press release that the Zapatista Bloc circulated previous to the protest. The bloc is formed by a group of local anarchists who value indigenous rights of self-governance, but many other Boston activists were present at the rally as well.

At the forum Calderon talked about his plans for investment and privatization of Mexico as a main focus for generating jobs. "The goal is to make Mexico the best place for foreign investment in the world," he said. As a strong supporter of free trade agreements like NAFTA and Plan Puebla Panama, Calderon wants to develop infrastructure from "coast to coast" and apply a strong hand (ie, through the national armed forces) to accomplish the stability required for foreign investment. "There are a lot of investors who are looking for a safe place to invest," he said.

Unfortunately, the biggest investor in Mexico, the United States, is seeking to help control of the region by pumping it with a \$1.4 billion military aid package over the next three years, to be debated on in the U.S. Congress. Such aid, which includes counterinsurgency training, is said to be to fight the war on drugs, but the U.S.-sponsored militarization of Latin America is well-known for its brutal after effects, particularly among corrupt armed forces.

"If you see dust in the air, don't mind us, we're cleaning the house," said Calderon referring to war on crime in his country. However, critics of Calderon's short tenure say that his strong-hand tactics will likely overrun the rights of Mexico's poorest, particularly in indigenous-populated areas in the south. One of the protesters last night, Bryan O'Connell, an Equal Exchange staff member who just came back from visiting Chiapas, was shocked to witness the kind of repressive politics in the region. "Paramilitaries are acting out in the open, particularly in the last 2-3 months," he said.

An indigenous autonomous region, Chiapas has tried for more than a decade to settle an agreement with the Mexican government to safeguard their rights for self-governance. Zapatistas negate the classic capitalist neoliberal ideals affirming that it is not a sustainable system and would like a chance to practice their own indigenous social values through collective decision-making and a better coexistence with nature.

Yet, the indigenous claim is seen as a threat to the established powers who benefit from absolute control of the region for the exploitation of its natural resources. According to the Zapatista mobilization in Chiapas, four communities were forcefully displaced in August 2007 from the biological reserve they had been set up to protect, Montes Azules en la Selva Lacandona. Since September, members of the Bolon Ajaw community have been threatened and harassed, including the setting of fire of several homes, by the paramilitary force active in the region, the OPDDIC. In December and January, three activists were targeted and shot by members of the same group, two of them (Eliseo Silvano Jiménez and his son Eliseo Silvano Espinoza) were subjected to torture while in detention.

The collision between these two worlds has historically been a violent one, which today is eminent in the show of force in Oaxaca and Chiapas led by Calderon's military. The indigenous of the America's have always been seen as a threat to the system, yet the most recent influx of tourism has happened, ironically, because of its people's unique vision of the world.

In Oaxaca, thousands tried to make proposals for better government—a government less prone to corruption—but have been met consistently with state repression led by the state's governor Ulises Ruiz. In the past two years many have died and many others remain illegally detained. One such activist who was detained in clashes with the police in Oaxaca last year, David Venegas Reyes "Alebrije", wrote from jail: "In Oaxaca, a state whose regions are inhabited by sixteen Indian nations, dispersed in ten thousand communities, a state in which we city dwellers are descendants and heirs to this Mesoamerican Civilization, autonomy is a reality in many towns and villages. It takes the form of self government based on traditional customs and practices. Although it is limited by the government and the political parties and attacked by the same forces, it is possible to observe autonomy in practice in many indigenous and mestizo communities, where it stands as an example of what may be viable for our society as a whole in the future." Indeed, the same people seeking peace in the region claim that their world does not need to be set against the government's agenda if such sincerely includes, a unified Mexico in all its diversity.

Calderon's promises at Harvard's JFK Forum indeed seemed inclusive of many progressive ideals including universal health care, a safer immigration policy at both the northern and southern borders, low-interest loans for micro businesses, social security for those working in the informal market, better relations with Latin American countries, including Venezuela and Bolivia, and an environmental agenda that's inclusive of the Kyoto Protocol. Many argue that his ideals of economic growth through free market policies will sweep the most vulnerable in a continent where indigenous peoples have been denied for centuries their right to life, Zapatista-style. It also remains to be seen how civil society in Mexico reacts if NAFTA-plus is implemented. On January 31 as many 300,000 protesters marched the streets of Mexico city to demand a renegotiation of the free trade agreement to guarantee certain trade protections against agricultural items like corn, which can't compete against the heavily subsidized items flooding from the United States and Canada. Free trade agreements have been known to benefit big companies while undermining local labor and environmental laws. NAFTA has been largely blamed for forced migration to the north and the loss of jobs in rural areas, coupled with an invasion of maquiladoras that compete amongst themselves to offer foreign investors the least restrictions and lowest wages.

"It's the same speech we've heard from PRI and PAN for decades," complained Gilberto Humar, a recently arrived immigrant from Mexico who was among the protesters at Harvard. He did not believe in Calderon's promise for jobs because he said that in Sonora, where he is from, jobs have been disappearing since NAFTA took over. He himself was convinced he could make enough at his local maquiladora, where he left most of his friends, and made his trek up north.

The resistance against "free trade" is coming from all sectors of the Mexican civil society, but it started most definitely in the south. As early as 1994 the Zapatistas declared themselves unilaterally against NAFTA. Their ideals all of a sudden seem closer with Mexico's hope for their future than Calderon's vision of the same old Mexico

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Once on the ballot, the Green Party can stay on by garnering 5% of the vote in any statewide race. This year we also have **Art Browning** running for Railroad Commission, **Charles Waterbury** for Supreme Court Chief Justice, and several candidates for President: **Jesse Johnson**, **Cynthia McKinney**, **Kent Mesplay** and Texas's own **kat swift**.

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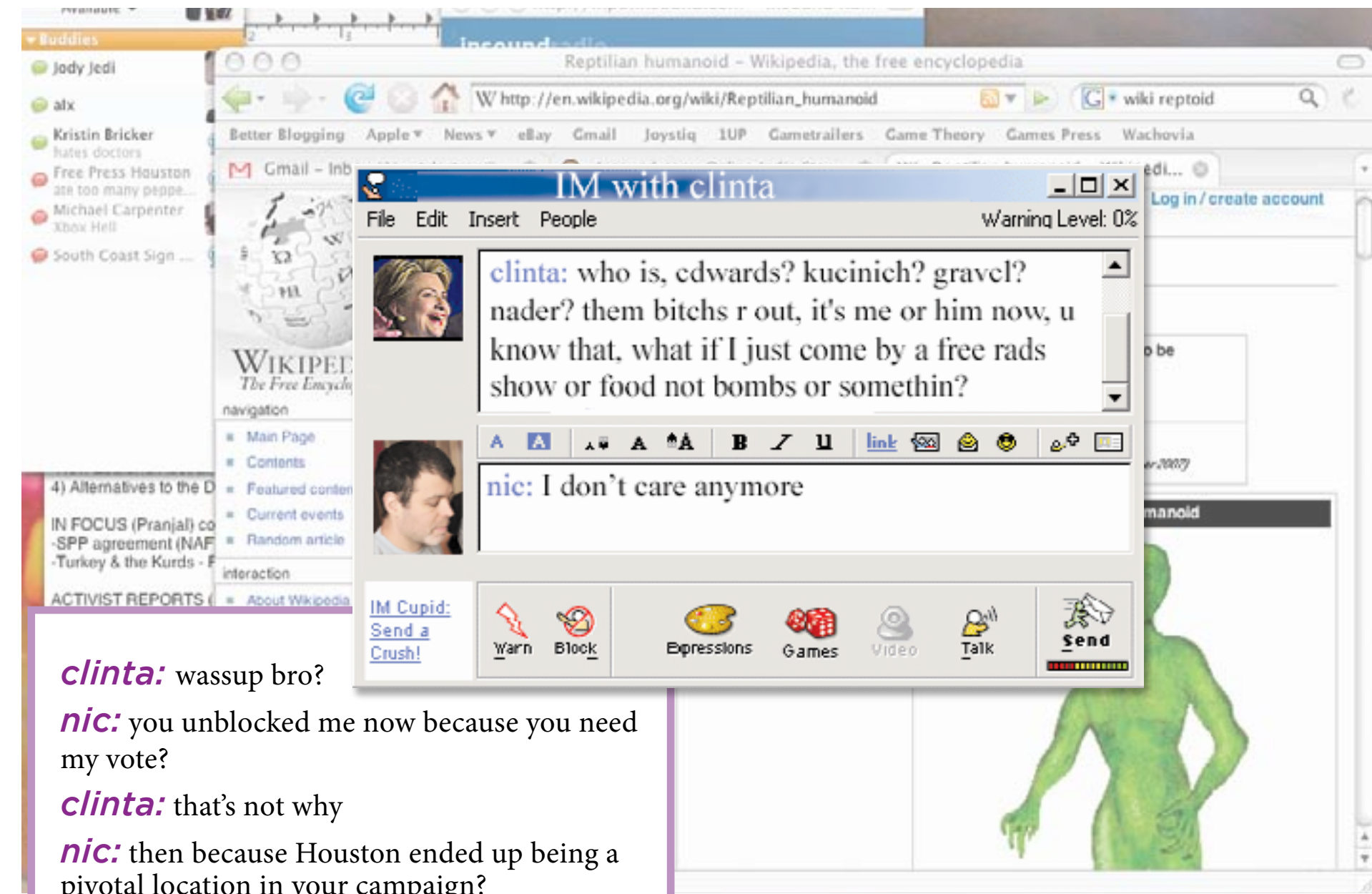
